
What are your favourite pictures from a story? Why do you like them?




Playdough flower pots- with either made flowers, real flowers, fake flowers throw a dice and add the correct amount to the pot

<p>Can you find a plant in your garden that is taller than you? Can you find one that is taller than mummy or daddy? Can you find one smaller than you?</p> <p>If you have a packet of potatoes or carrots what order would you put them in? could you draw round them to show me the order?</p> <p>Using duplo measure a flower that you can find in your garden, in a pot or maybe in a vase. Can you count how many bricks tall they are?</p>	<p>Can you make a beanstalk? You could use lego, tubes, boxes, paper, paint. Add leaves and think about where your beanstalk could lead.</p> <p>Look at some vegetables- what shapes are they? What do they feel like? Have a go at drawing them- think about their shape and colour. Could you add something to add texture?</p> <p>vegetable printing- ask an adult to cut some veg that isn't needed in half. Use the halves to print patterns. Can you repeat your pattern?</p> <p>Toilet roll flower tops- paint 2/3rds of a toilet roll green and the rest a flower colour. 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Phonics Phase 1 and 2

1. c k u r- introduce the sounds. Make little groups of objects you can find with the initial sound.
2. Watch Mr Thorne and Geraldine. Watch alphablocks.
3. Collect objects that are cvc- dog cat pig pen peg etc. sound out the word for your child- can they find the object?
4. Make sound targets to be hit with bean bags nerf gun bullets pebbles etc
5. With the sounds satipmnd make cvc words and add sound buttons under each sound so your child can see (big dots). Touch the sound with your finger and say the sounds. Blend the sounds into the word. When your child is confident they can do it with you.



6. Use post its or marker on large duplo.
Can your child find the bricks to build the word?
