INNOVATED EXAMPLE – The baboon and the butterfly

Where? (setting) A colourful, noisy jungle. Bright flowers spring from towering trees whilst long vines swing like ropes in a playground.	Who? (characters) A cheeky baboon A colourful, gentle butterfly	Beginning – the opening scene A cheeky baboon is swinging through the trees on the look out for something delicious to eat. Just then, a butterfly lands on his hand just as he is about to make his next swing. It tickles his hand, the baboon loses his grip and misses his next vine! He tumbles into the soft leaves below.	Suddenly... A very cross baboon grabs the butterfly. He grabs the nearest vine and begins his journey to the tree tops ready to settle and eat the butterfly for his breakfast.. Don't eat me, please!
The deal... The butterfly made a deal with the baboon: If you let me go, one day I will repay you...	The problem.. One day whilst out swinging, the baboon hurts his arm, so he cannot swing to catch any food to eat. He sits on a branch for days feeling miserable and very hungry....	The solution... The butterfly spots him and gathers all her flying mates to collect as many berries and seeds as possible. They fly them up to the baboon, so that he doesn't have to move to eat.	The moral One good deed deserves another .
